CHANCE TO SHINE

Chance to Shine Street runs free, structured cricket coaching and competition sessions in deprived, urban areas, where gang culture, street crime and other anti-social activities can be problematic, in order to engage with young people aged 8-24, giving them the opportunity to enjoy and learn through cricket, helping them to raise their aspirations and reach their full potential.

Charterhouse in Southwark has been funding Chance to Shine Cricket for many years, but more recently the Street Cricket programme. It's played with a tapeball, a tennis ball wrapped in electrical tape, plastic bats and matches last for just 20 minutes – it's cricket's answer to 5-a-side football!

A NOTE FROM THE DIRECTOR

Over my two years here I have worked hard to ensure that our grants match the stated focus of our funds. I am happy that our current list of grant recipients match this aim particularly well and am pleased to be actively engaged with all of them.

I feel fortunate to have had such a supportive board of Trustees to work with. They have granted the funding of a broad spectrum of projects that are making a real difference to the lives of disadvantaged young people of Southwark, ensuring they can access activities and support from which they might otherwise be excluded. Some of these charities are at early stage and others well established, either way it's been a pleasure to work closely with the grantees to understand their impact and most effective approaches. The charity joined other local funders at a meeting at Southwark Council this December to discuss the needs of the community and to hear from the council about areas of need and gaps so that we can share information, which was been immensely helpful in focusing on gaps and specific areas of need. THE ACCESS PROJECT



The Access Project is an education charity that helps bright young students from disadvantaged backgrounds gain places at top universities. Charterhouse in Southwark has funded their work in Walworth Academy for the past two years where they have had tremendous success.

The grant helped support a dedicated school-based staff member who mentors the students, so they have the knowledge and support to make strong university applications. In addition, volunteers are trained and supported to be effective tutors who work with the students outside of school to help raise their grades and give some insight into the possibilities once finished at university.

Huge congratulations to the 2019 cohort who done so well this year.

TREASURER'S REPORT

For the second year in a row, in 2018/19 Charterhouse in Southwark awarded over £100,000, ranging from £2,264 to £13,055, to 13 different organisations.

We received a record number of grant applications, a consequence of the hard work in the past two years building our profile in the Southwark area. The Trustees believe this has helped us further strengthen our ability to achieve our main objective: to support as wide a number and as wide a range of young people as possible in the London Borough of Southwark and its near environs.

Trustees have again monitored the efficiency and cost base of the charity. To this end, during the year we started a review of our investment management strategy. The objective was to ensure our fund manager's approach remains appropriate to the needs of the Charity. After the year-end, we made the decision to split the management of our investments, with around one quarter of funds transferred to another fund management firm.

We are very grateful indeed for the support from regular donors, where the income provides us with an element of certainty when considering grant applications. For the fifth year, a Trustee generously provided the funds to meet the costs of employing our part time employee.
